

My Apprenticeship Application Experience

I am in year 13 and have decided that I do not want to continue in full time education. Instead the idea of learning while working appeals to me more. During the process I have found the answers to a lot of questions, and I have created a Q&A and top tips that might help future students.

Are University and Apprenticeship applications the same?

No. All university applications are completed through UCAS with one form. Where-as all apprenticeships are applied for individually and have different processes. There is a deadline for applying through UCAS. However, apprenticeship all have different posting dates and deadline dates. University requires an application form similar to a CV and a personal statement. The apprenticeship applications also require online assessments in numeracy, contextual situations and verbal reasoning.

Is it easy to get an apprenticeship?

No. Not only is the application process longer there is a lot of competition. I started applying in December and will keep applying until I am successful.

Are all apprenticeships the same?

No. There are different levels. Level 3 is equivalent to A levels. Level 4 is Higher and Level 6 is Degree level. The titles also vary depending on the company. I started applying for Degree Apprenticeships and then looked at level 3 and 4. Most companies will encourage you to progress from the lower level.

Are they all the same length?

No. The lower levels are 12 months, going up to 4 years for a degree. The advantage of doing a level 3 is that if I enjoy it I can still progress on to a Degree or Degree Apprenticeship. However, if it is not what I want then I can leave and try a different sector/subject.

Is the training on the job or at a College/University?

This depends on the company, some have their own academies and training centres. Others you are sent to a local college or university either for 1 day a week or blocks. I like the idea of going to College or University as I will meet other Apprentices.

How did you find out about what apprenticeships were?

There is lots of information on the College Careers OneNote page. We had presentations in Seminars (assemblies). I took part in remote webinars from: Alps; NAW; GetMyFirstJob; Uptree; Pearson Business School; and University of Law, there were loads of others.

How do you find out about vacancies?

I registered with Find an Apprenticeship at https://www.gov.uk/apply-apprenticeship, they send email updates when an apprenticeship is posted that matches my search criteria. I also registered with Rate my apprenticeship, GetMyFirstJob and Uptree who send email updates. Plus the information from the College's Careers OneNote page.

What are the online assessments?

This varies for each company, although most to a contextual/situational assessment. This is where you choose how you would respond to a case study situation or an email. There was a personality type assessment which asked about likes and preferences. The numerical assessments can be anything from very hard maths to games involving puzzles, shapes and using your memory. Before you start the assessments they go through the instructions and provide a trial/practice. Some companies have practice assessments on their websites. There are companies that offer practice assessments, some are free and others you have to pay for.

5 Top Tips

- Listen to webinars to make sure it is what you want.
- Create a CV with all your important personal details, qualifications dates and grades, work experiences, skills and hobbies.
- Create a personal statement and include in it:
 - Why you want to do an apprenticeship
 - Why that company (this can be customised later)
 - Experiences that support the application
 - How demonstrated employability skills such as team work, organisation, adaptability, leadership
 - How your current studies support your application
- Practice online assessments
- Be patient, you will need to complete a number of applications, possibly 20+.






