On Saturday 9 March, two teams from Collingwood competed in the Oxford Finals Day. The Oxford Schools Debating Competition is the largest schools debating competition in the world and involves thousands of teams from across the globe.

On Saturday there were teams from Venezuela, across Europe, Canada, America, Hong Kong and many other countries all competing to be champions. All the top fee-paying schools from around the UK were well represented too.

Each team was already a winner in the sense that they had already won their region or their country in order to be able to compete on finals day, so the standard was incredibly high.

Collingwood B (Alex Baker and Chloe Burrows) performed very well throughout the day, taking two firsts and a second in four rounds of debating.

Collingwood A (Ellie Bean and Bethan Wood) stunned everyone by taking the maximum points possible with four straight wins, topping the table as the only team on maximum points at the end of four rounds.

Ellie was joint best speaker (in the world!) along with her England team mate from St Paul's Girls' and a student from Eton.

The top eight teams in the table (including Collingwood) competed in the semi-finals, and we were disappointed not to be one of the four to reach the Grand Final, but pleased for our friends from St Paul's Girls' who won the final.

As ever, our students did us proud and have established Collingwood as one of the very top debating schools not just in this country, but around the world.

There is no time to rest on our laurels and we will have to do the whole thing all over again next Saturday as we compete in Finals Day at the Cambridge Union. This is a smaller competition but no less difficult and the standard will be very high. We are all looking forward to the challenge!

ATTENDANCE - LEAVE OF ABSENCE/ HOLIDAY REQUESTS

Just to remind parents/carers that if they take their children out of school without authority, they will be liable to receive a penalty notice. Currently the amount payable under a penalty notice is £60.00 per parent/carer per child if paid within 21 days. Thereafter the amount increases to £120.00 if paid between 21 and 28 days. If the penalty notice remains unpaid after 28 days, the Local Authority will consider a prosecution in the Magistrates Court. Please note that penalty notices are issued per parent/carer per child so a family of two parents and two children will receive 4 penalty notices.

YEAR 7 STUDENT DELIVERS ASSEMBLIES ABOUT RAMADAN






