#### Completion of Window Replacements - Kingston Building

I am pleased to report that this week saw the last new window installed in Kingston building as part of the £1.25m upgrade works that started in the summer. A few final details aside, this project is now complete. As well as providing the building with a facelift, the new windows and doors have significantly improved the thermal comfort and natural light in teaching spaces. Thanks to our excellent site team and project team, capital funding was secured from the Department for Education to fund the works; they have run to schedule and to budget, and we are delighted with the end result.

#### Important Reminder: Visits to School Site by Appointment Only

I would like to remind you that visits to the College site must be prearranged and approved through prior communication with College staff. This ensures the safety and security of all students and staff and allows us to manage our time and resources effectively. As I am sure you will understand, it is simply not possible for our staff to be immediately available as they have teaching, duty or meeting commitments.

Please do not come into College expecting to see a member of staff without an appointment as this will be a wasted journey for you and cause you lost time and unnecessary frustration. If you need to meet with a teacher, staff member or College leadership, please contact the College office to schedule an appointment.

#### **Important Reminder: 3-day Response to Parental Communications**

I would also like to remind you that we have a **72-hour response** period for staff to reply to parental communications. It is obviously unreasonable to expect immediate responses to emails or messages when staff have full teaching and meeting commitments. This protocol also allows us time to investigate your communication and to reply with a detailed response to you. Dear Headteacher

The Select Committee will be investigating how to transform support and improve outcomes for children with special education needs across England and to do this, they are urging individuals to submit written evidence on the current state of SEND provision.

The Committee is seeking evidence on short term actions to stabilise the SEND system which is currently experiencing increased demand, protracted waiting times and increased pressure on schools and local authorities. The Committee will also be looking at how, beyond stability, long term sustainability of the SEND system can be achieved to support and improve outcomes for children and young people with SEND.

Mindful of previous reviews that have taken place in this area, and the evidence that already exists about the nature and scale of the problem, the Committee would welcome evidence primarily focused on solutions.

We will take particular care to ensure that the voices and experiences of children and young people with SEND are at the heart of our inquiry. We welcome evidence from parents and carers, early years settings, schools, local authorities, voluntary sector organisations, professionals, sector bodies and anyone else with an interest in the system of support for children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities.

Given the sensitive nature of this inquiry, not all of the evidence we receive will be published.

The Committee has discretion over which submissions it accepts as evidence, and which of those it then publishes on its website.

The Committee may decide to accept evidence on a confidential basis. Confidential submissions remain available to the Committee but are not published or referred to in public.

For safeguarding reasons and to avoid identification, please refrain from naming specific people, educational settings, or children in your submission.

We would like to assure you that the Committee will consider all written evidence, whether or not it is published.

I advise you to promote this to parents of children with SEND in your schools.



YEAR 8 ART STUDENTS COMPLETE

**IMPRESSIVE WORK** 

During her lesson drop-ins, Miss Watling (Principal) expressed how impressed she was with the work that Year 8 students were doing in their recent Art lessons. They were engaged in painting their colourful, abstracted Cubist portraits using watercolour paints.



The students are coming to the end of their project looking at portraiture, using their own portraits to try different techniques and abstractions. They began with copying a gridded portrait of a celebrity of their choice to look at where the features actually are, also appreciating that



the head is not always directly facing the viewer. Following this, they were offered the chance to have their photographs taken so that they could use these to look at their own features – this is the first time we have tried to do this.

From these line drawings, scaled up using a hand drawn grid, the students explored two techniques: Oil Pastel, inspired by Van Gogh, and Synthetic Cubism with reference to Picasso's Weeping Woman.


#### LIBRARY POEM COMPETITION WINNERS




So many students come to the medical room reporting headaches and dizziness. When they are asked if they have a water bottle, they say no. Headaches and dizziness are often caused by dehydration.


Please ensure your children all have a water bottle with them at college and drink something with their breakfast at the start of the day. Thank you.


#### **Mornings**

This is up from 77,000 in 2022 (+33.8%) and 58,000 in 2019 (+77.5%).

#### **SUCCESS STORIES**

This student struggled in school and finally got a dyslexia diagnosis in year 9. She searched for careers suitable for those with dyslexia. To learn more about jobs in a hospital, she did a one day work experience at her local Hospital.

For her GCSE exams, she was allocated extra time; After Year 11, she chose to study BTEC Health and Social Care which meant doing assessment rather than just exams. She decided to have a scribe to support her with the one exam she did need to do as part of her course.

After Year 13, she applied to Hertfordshire University to study BSc Diagnostic Radiography and Imaging.

The course is integrated with blocks of lectures at university and work placements at a local Hospital. It is hard work but a practical hands on subject. She was assessed and awarded access arrangements:

- Lecturers to provide powerpoint 48 hour in advance.
- Support for course work and exams.
- She received a £6000 bursary each year.

Parents of autistic children face the usual positives and challenges of parenting and quite a few more. Attending a Cygnet autism support programme gives parents and carers an opportunity to develop their understanding of autism and consider ways to support their child. It also provides the opportunity to meet other people in a similar position and hear about their experiences in an informal but supportive atmosphere.

#### When and where is Cygnet delivered?

Courses will be taking place all over Surrey at a range of times and locations. Some courses will be delivered online. When you complete the application form, tell us what you would prefer and we will contact you when a suitable course becomes available.

#### Who can attend cygnet sessions?

Parents, carers or other family members who have responsibility for your child. You child needs to be between the ages of 5-18 and live in Surrey. They may have a diagnosis of autism, or be waiting for one.

#### What does Cygnet involve?

The **core** Cygnet programme is delivered over six two and a half to three-hour sessions which include:

- Introductory session
- An overview of autism with parent and carer experience
- Thinking & Sensory
- Social Interaction & Communication
- Understanding and supporting behaviour
- Analysing behaviour

#### Who will deliver my Cygnet course?

Surrey's Cygnet offer is coordinated through the Autism Outreach team, based at Freemantles school, but our team of trainers are made up from professionals working across Surrey in education, health and charity organisations.
