EXAM CERTIFICATES

Exam certificate postage payment is available on ParentPay. Please ensure payment is made as soon as possible to ensure your child receives their exam certificates for the summer 2024 season. This is of particular importance for those students in Years 11 and 13 who are leaving the College.

To avoid certificates being lost in transit or left crumpled at the bottom of a school bag, we encourage payment to be made for Years 9 and 10 too.

For those that make payment for postage, exam certificates are usually despatched in December using Royal Mail's 'Signed For' service.

Certificates will be required by future employers and further education institutes. If you do not have your certificates when you need them in later life, the exam boards can provide a replacement statement of results but it is very costly.

ATTENDANCE - LEAVE OF ABSENCE/ HOLIDAY REQUESTS

Just to remind parents/carers that if they take their children out of school without authority, they will be liable to receive a penalty notice. Currently the amount payable under a penalty notice is £60.00 per parent/carer per child if paid within 21 days. Thereafter the amount increases to £120.00 if paid between 21 and 28 days. If the penalty notice remains unpaid after 28 days, the Local Authority will consider a prosecution in the Magistrates Court. Please note that penalty notices are issued per parent/carer per child so a family of two parents and two children will receive 4 penalty notices.

BEHAVIOUR AND UNIFORM STANDARDS

As a follow up to my communication prior to the Easter break, I wanted to inform you of our continued drive on behaviour and uniform standards and the content of the assemblies that have taken place, or are taking place, this week.

There is a clear message being relayed to all students in assemblies in an attempt to address the following:

- ◆ Group/mob mentality in playgrounds (they have been educated on what Joint Enterprise is)
- ◆ Lack of respect for the environment - damage caused to areas and dropping litter
- ◆ Physical responses to an issue - in particular invasion of personal space
- ◆ Punctuality - to school and lessons
- ◆ Uniform standards
- ◆ Defiance.

Students have been asked to question their behaviour and whether they are contributing, at times, to lowering our standards. They have been made aware of the escalation of sanctions to deal with persistent rule breaking and we have reiterated that we are intent on maintaining our high standards.

I would like to especially draw attention to our strategy on defiance (stated below) in order to ensure that the partnership between home and College can produce as much success for our students as possible.

Procedure

1. A student refuses to comply with an instruction.
2. The staff member labels the behaviour as defiance, e.g. 'Are you defying me?' or 'Are you refusing to follow my instruction?' and the student will have another opportunity to comply. If the student then complies there will be no consequence.
3. Should the student continue to defy the request, a callout (departmental or in-lesson callout) will be requested. They will be taken out of the lesson (momentarily or for the remainder of the lesson depending on the importance/significance of the request) and kept in isolation for the remainder of the lesson. Should the student continue to refuse to comply or to leave the lesson then they are **likely to be included for gross defiance**. Should the defiance happen at breaktime, the teacher will inform the student that the procedure will be followed through by the Pastoral team.
4. Parents will be notified that the student will be called to a detention for an hour on the appropriate day. Failure to arrive at detention will escalate the sanction.
5. Students with regular defiance issues will be escalated up the support and sanction scale.

FIRST AID ATTENDANCE IN COLLEGE

The College offers first aid assistance to students who are unwell or injured during the course of the College day.

However, we are unable to offer advice on existing injuries or medical conditions that students may have. These should be discussed at home, and a GP appointment made if required.

Students must first register for their lesson before attending first aid. Teachers will provide students with a special lanyard which indicates they are permitted to be out of their lesson.

The vast majority of students attending first aid come complaining of headaches OR nausea. During our initial assessments we have discovered that many have not eaten or had a drink, and are therefore most likely dehydrated. May we please seek assistance from parents/carers to encourage your child to bring **water into College each day**. Barossa canteen provides water during break and lunch times and students are free to refill bottles. There are also some water fountains across the campus.

Our College Improvement Plan advocates no learning wasted and as such if students are feeling unwell during break or lunch, they are expected to attend first aid at that time, rather than waiting until lessons resume and therefore miss valuable learning.

Period 5 is also a peak time for first aid attendance. We try our utmost to encourage students to return to lesson, particularly from 2.35pm onwards which is close to the end of the College day. There are of course exceptions to this such as a sports injury.

If your child has a cough, there is little we can do to help them. Please remind them to drink plenty of water and, where possible, send them to College with lozenges to help ease their cough.


Finally, students should not call home directly but report to first aid if feeling unwell for us to assess them and make calls home if required.

Thank you for your support with our first aid guidelines.

We in turn, as always, will continue to care and support your child/children with any first aid issues they may have during the College day.

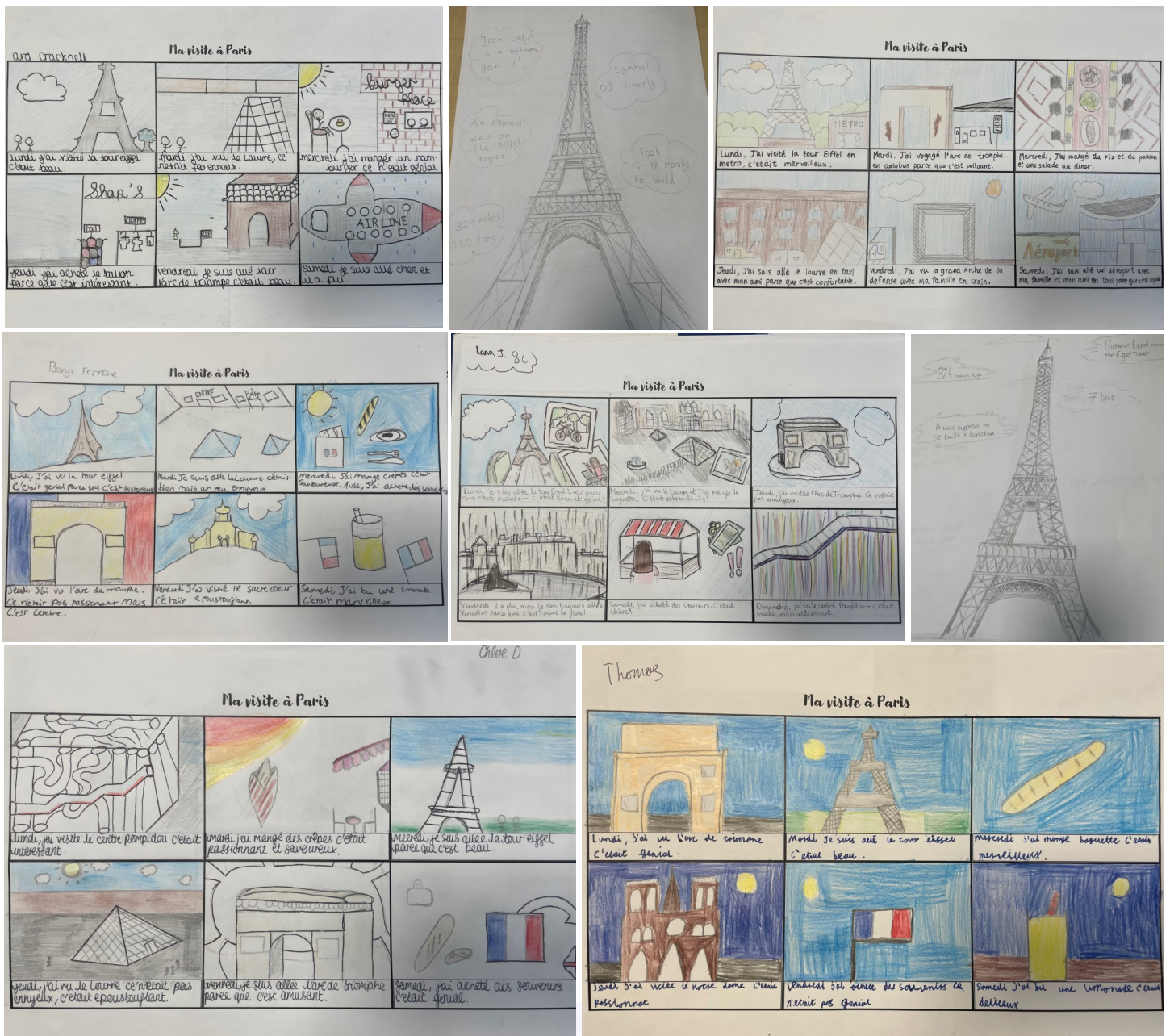

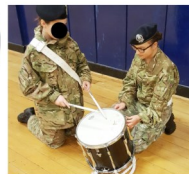
